COUCHES DON'T COUNT

Formerly homeless teens and young adults advocated for ending youth homelessness through Youth 4 Change, setting up couches at events throughout town.



VOLUNTEER APPRECIATION CELEBRATION

Last year, a total of 4,365 volunteers provided 7,800 hours of service and were honored at a celebration in April.



CRAWFISH FESTIVAL

For the third year in a row, The Secret Order of Crawdaddies hosted its annual Cajun-themed festival to benefit reStart.



RELISH FOR RESTART

Our new gala event in June featured singing and juggling former Chiefs players and much more – plus it raised nearly \$60,000 to support our mission.

RESTART ACCESSIBLE HOUSING

reStart began a new permanent housing program this year, providing wheelchair-accessible housing for low-income individuals with a physical disability. Our RAH complex offers 18 apartments, with preference given to veterans with disabilities.

ENDING VETERAN HOMELESSNESS

In November, Kansas City became the first city in Missouri or Kansas certified by the federal government for effectively ending Veteran homelessness.

SERVING YOUTH IN JOHNSON COUNTY

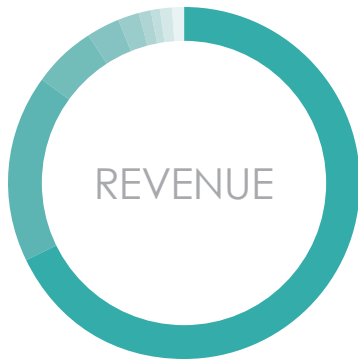
Plans are now underway for reStart to open its 14th location – and its first in Johnson County, Kansas – to provide a transitional living center for homeless and runaway youth. The new program will provide beds for up to 10 youth at a time.
